HOT OCCUPATIONS IN THE KENYAN LABOUR MARKET APRIL 1 TO JUNE 30, 2016

This report provides a quarterly analysis of job advertisements published in the Daily Nation, The Standard and The East African Newspapers between April 1 and June 30, 2016. The total number of job vacancies posted in the said newspapers for the period was 4604. Of these, Nursing and Midwifery Professionals vacancies were 601, Universities and Post Secondary Teachers/Lecturers 407, Electrical, Electronics and Telecommunications Engineers 318 and Protective Service Workers 315. - The **basic general programmes** include: Pre-primary, Elementary, Primary, Secondary education.
- Business and Administration include : Retailing, Marketing, Sales, Public Relations, Real Estate; Finance, Banking, Insurance, Investment Analysis;

Accounting, Auditing, Bookkeeping; Management, Public Administration, Institutional Administration, Personnel Administration; Secretarial and Office Work.

- Engineering and engineering trades include: Engineering drawing, Mechanics, Metal work, Electricity, Electronics, Telecommunications, Energy and Chemical Engineering, Vehicle maintenance, Surveying.
- Social Services include: Social care: care of the disabled, childcare, youth services, gerontological services; Social work: counseling and welfare not elsewhere classified.
