# HOT OCCUPATIONS IN THE KENYAN LABOUR MARKET JULY 1 TO SEPTEMBER 30, 2016

This report provides a quarterly analysis of job advertisements published in the Daily Nation, The Standard and The East African Newspapers between July 1 and September 30, 2016. The total number of job vacancies posted in the said newspapers for the period was 5,565. Of these, Government Administrators vacancies were 927, Primary Education Teachers 878 Specialized Departmental Managers 301, and Protective Service Workers 299. These were the occupations most featured in the newspapers over the reference period (See Table 1)
