HOT OCCUPATIONS IN THE KENYAN LABOUR MARKET JULY 1 TO SEPTEMBER 30, 2017

This report provides a quarterly analysis of job advertisements published in the Daily Nation, The Standard and The East African Newspapers between 1stJuly to 30th September 2017. The total number of job vacancies posted in the said newspapers for the period was 3197. Of these, Directors and chief executives accounted for 26.71 percent, followed by Government Administrators who accounted for 13.86%, Pre-primary education teachers 11.29% and Business and public service middle level personnel 5.38%.

The occupations most featured in the newspapers over the reference period are tabulated here below (See Table 1)
